We also saw the continued resurgence of **Global Medical Brigades**, which reached pre-pandemic momentum thanks to the trust and engagement of our international volunteers and the tireless efforts of our local teams. With clinics operating year-round and hundreds of Community Health Entrepreneurs now serving as vital access points to care, we've reinforced the principle that access to healthcare shouldn't depend on geography or income.

Our **Squads Abroad** program has emerged as a vibrant engine for impact and intergenerational change. Over 1,000 high school students joined us this year, building infrastructure in schools and co-developing projects that serve thousands. Their enthusiasm and dedication give us hope for a future where youth aren't just participants—they're changemakers.

We also continued to advance our commitment to environmental sustainability through our **carbon offsetting program**, partnering with rural farmers in Honduras to plant over 11,000 trees. This initiative not only sequesters carbon from volunteer travel, but also provides long-term income opportunities for local families and helps combat deforestation.

All of this was made possible through the incredible generosity of our supporters. Because of you, thousands of families now have access to clean water, public health infrastructure, and sustainable economic opportunities. Your contributions enable our programs to continue long after volunteers return home, making the biggest impact in the quiet, everyday moments like a family having a working bathroom, a child drinking clean water, and a mother earning income from her home business.

Together, we closed 2024 having reached nearly 375,000 individuals and more than 440 partner communities across Central America, West Africa, and Europe. Yet the real story is what lies ahead.

With our Empowered 1M campaign well underway, we are building the systems and partnerships to equip one million individuals with the tools to thrive. None of this would be possible without you — our volunteers, partners, donors, and community leaders who make this movement possible every day. It has been 20 years since Global Brigades first planted its roots in the mountains of eastern Honduras. What began as a grassroots medical relief effort has grown into a trusted global health and development movement, powered by the dedication of more than 100,000 volunteers. Over two decades, our reach has expanded across Central America and into two additional continents, transforming lives in seven countries through a holistic model that integrates healthcare, economic opportunity, and water and sanitation solutions.

In 2009, we launched our first clean water project in El Zurzular.

Honduras—our first Empowered Community where, together with local leadership, every program of the Holistic Model was implemented. By 2011, El Zurzular was officially inaugurated, paving the way for more than 50 partner communities worldwide to follow.

As our work deepened, we sought new ways to address systemic challenges. In 2015, we began laying the groundwork with what would become **Eskala**, a groundbreaking approach to economic empowerment that reimagines microfinance through community-owned banks and small business investment. Eskala has since expanded across Honduras, Panama, and Ghana proving that sustainable change requires both health and economic resilience.

We continued to grow with the launch of **Squads Abroad** in 2019, engaging high school students in meaningful global service, and **Kambia** in 2020, connecting university faculty and students through project-based international learning. Together with Eskala, these initiatives advance our **Empowered 1M** vision, supporting one million individuals to achieve improved, sustainable livelihoods.

Collaboration has been central to every milestone. Our impact has only been possible through the leadership of communities, the commitment of student and professional volunteers, and the partnership of organizations including the Merkel Family, World Bank, UNDP, Kiva, UNICEF, Inter-American Development Bank, Rotary International, and many others.

As we celebrate 20 years of friendship, innovation, and impact, we are grateful for the trust of our stakeholders and the resilience of our partner communities. Looking ahead, we remain committed to building sustainable, inclusive change for decades to come.



Our Holistic Model





Global Brigades' Holistic Model remained the cornerstone of our impact in 2024. Developed and refined over the past twenty years, this comprehensive, community-driven approach addresses interconnected challenges in health, water and sanitation, and economic development. To mitigate healthcare disparities, we operate both mobile and permanent clinics while equipping Community Health Entrepreneurs to provide sustained access to essential medical services.

Our WASH (Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene) initiatives expand clean water infrastructure, strengthen safe sanitation systems, and promote hygiene practices that support preventative healthcare. Concurrently, our economic development programs, focused on investing in Community Banks and consulting small businesses, enhance financial inclusion and foster sustainable livelihoods. Through this integrated three-pronged approach, Global Brigades advances long-term resilience and empowers communities to direct their own pathways toward sustainable development.

Global Brigades and the UN Sustainable Development Goals

The United Nations' 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development is comprised of 17 widely arching Sustainable Development Goals (SDG). These goals are global calls to action for countries and organizations alike to partner in ending poverty and creating peace and prosperity for all.

Global Brigades contributes to SDG6 by improving access to sufficient, affordable, and clean water, and improved sanitation, in our partner communities. In collaboration with community members, we designed and constructed sustainable water systems and in-home sanitation solutions, supported by affordable financing mechanisms, local partnerships, and donor investment. Engineering, Water, and Public Health Brigade volunteers played a central role by working directly with communities to assess public health challenges, develop Community Health Action Plans, and provide education on water, sanitation, and hygiene best practices. This integrated approach not only delivered essential infrastructure but also strengthened local knowledge and leadership, ensuring long-term impact and healthier, more resilient communities.

All Global Brigades programs integrate capacity building and skills development, with a strong focus on empowering women. By expanding access to education, credit, and leadership opportunities, women and girls gain the tools to challenge traditional gender roles, pursue income-generating activities, and strengthen their influence within households and communities. Improved access to water and sanitation further reduces the burden of water collection and supports menstrual hygiene management, enabling more consistent school attendance and well-being for girls. Our economic initiatives prioritize women leaders and entrepreneurs, fostering greater independence and resilience. In Central America, we collaborate with indigenous leaders to address persistent inequalities, while in Greece we extend affordable healthcare, financial education, and business support to refugees and asylum seekers.

Sustainable Cities & Communities

Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable.

In 2024, GB grew its new affordable housing initiative in southern Honduras, Montemar. Montemar is dedicated to ensuring access to safe, adequate, and affordable housing in partner communities, recognizing that secure housing is a foundation for broader sustainable development. By providing families with stable living environments, Montemar enabled greater investment in education, healthcare, and economic opportunities, while also contributing to improved physical and mental health outcomes. Beyond individual households, the initiative aims to support local economic growth by creating demand for jobs and services, and promoting sustainability through housing designs that reduce energy use, conserve resources, and minimize environmental impact.



Life on Land

Protect, restore and promote sustainable use of terrestrial ecosystems, sustainably manage forests, combat desertification, and halt and reverse land degradation and halt biodiversity loss

GB continues to advance its commitment to environmental sustainability by striving to offset emissions from volunteer travel and move toward carbon neutrality through our Carbon Offsetting Program. This initiative partners with local farmers to promote reforestation and sustainable land management practices that restore ecosystems and capture carbon. We also work alongside community leaders to safeguard water resources and provide education on conservation best practices, ensuring long-term stewardship of vital natural assets. In addition, sustainable and organic farming remain central to Eskala and our broader economic development programming, fostering environmentally responsible livelihoods that strengthen both communities and ecosystems.

Our Legal Empowerment program provides legal education and financial resources for vulnerable families to resolve legal challenges. We focus our work with women in remote, rural, and under-resourced communities who would otherwise have limited to no access to legal resources, and with refugee and migrant populations seeking asylum and integration.

Empowered



Since the launch of the Empowered 100 (E100) in 2017, Global Brigades has worked alongside community members, volunteers, donors, and local partners to implement our Holistic Model with the shared goal of building sustainable livelihoods. A livelihood encompasses the means by which individuals and households secure the essentials of life, including income, food, shelter, and basic services. Sustainable livelihoods, defined by their resilience, long-term viability, and the dignity and opportunity they provide, are central to sustainable development. They offer pathways out of poverty, promote responsible resource use, create opportunities for marginalized groups, and contribute directly to advancing the UN Sustainable Development Goals. In 2024, Global Brigades continued to build on decades of community development work through our Empowered 1M initiative, which aims to empower one million people worldwide to achieve improved and more sustainable livelihoods.

HONDURAS

Global Brigades was established in 2003 in Honduras, where the organization launched its first basic medical brigades in the partner communities of El Paraíso and Francisco Morazán. Since these humble roots, Honduras has since remained integral to the development of our mission, strategy, and methodology as an organization. Today, all Global Brigades programs are implemented in the country, with operations expanded to eight departments, reflecting our continued commitment to broadening impact and strengthening community partnerships.







HONDURAS

Healthcare Program:

In 2024, over 1,250 volunteers participated in in-person and virtual Medical and Dental programs in Honduras, providing affordable access to a range of healthcare services, including dental, optometry, OBGYN, and other specialties. The local team strengthened relationships with authorities and partner communities in our newest region of influence, La Paz.

We trained and equipped 40 new Community Health Entrepreneurs (CHEs) and conducted follow-up visits to ensure they could effectively provide daily access to affordable medications within their communities. By year's end, an additional CHE training had been initiated in La Paz. The urban clinic in Tegucigalpa operated throughout 2024, providing healthcare over 7,000 healthcare consultations to members of the city's vulnerable population.

HONDURAS

Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Program:

In 2024, the WASH program in Honduras continued to have a significant impact by expanding access to clean water in rural partner communities. The team advanced work on the Pueblo Nuevo water project in southern Honduras, the largest initiative to date, and constructed additional clean water systems in Tierras Morenas and Jorge Álvarez. In 4 additional communities, community leaders and partner organizations brought engineering designs, developed by GB staff and volunteers, to life, completing construction in 2024.

Engineering volunteers also developed water system designs for 7 new communities who can now pursue similar outcomes. Public Health volunteers collaborated with local technicians and community members to assess health needs, deliver Community Health Action Plans in three communities, and construct 48 sanitation units and nine eco-stoves for families.

HONDURAS

Economic Development Program:

In 2024, the Eskala Honduras team, in collaboration with SEMPRENDE and its network of Community Banks, established partnerships with banks in rural communities across Yoro, Olancho, and La Paz. The team piloted the use of Starlink satellite internet technology in select community banks to enhance connectivity, enabling the implementation of Eskala's online portfolio management software and expanding internet access for local communities.

Eskala also began shifting its focus from loans to micro-equity investments in Community Banks, with technicians dedicating the latter part of the year to introducing and socializing this new strategy with bank leaders. Additionally, Virtual Business Brigade volunteers provided consulting services to small businesses in 26 partner communities throughout Honduras.

HONDURAS

Don Cristobal was impressed with the time and attention he received from Eskala. Cristobal can't read, and the Eskala Honduras team took time to explain the process, contract, and repayment plan. He said, "When people recommend [Eskala], they say they are good and I see that you are very good!"



PANAMA

Global Brigades expanded to Panama in 2008, beginning with initiatives to increase access to financial services for some of the country's most isolated and vulnerable indigenous communities in the east. In subsequent years, healthcare and WASH programs were introduced, rounding out the implementation of the holistic model in Panama. Today, Eskala Panama stands as one of the leading microfinance institutions in rural areas and has been recognized by the United Nations Development Programme as a model for economic development. Over time, GB Panama has broadened its reach, now implementing development programming across seven provinces and three indigenous comarcas: Emberá-Wounaan, Guna Yala, and Ngäbe-Buglé.







PANAMA

WASH Program:

In 2024, the Panama Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) team, together with student volunteers, reached more communities than ever before. Construction projects on clean drinking water systems initiated in 2023 were completed, while new infrastructure improvements began in additional partner communities.

Across 10 rural communities, staff, volunteers, and community members collaborated to enhance access to clean water, ultimately benefiting nearly 8,000 community members. Public Health volunteers also addressed hygiene and sanitation challenges in Toro Bravo and Guacuco Guna, constructing upgraded sanitation facilities in the primary school and cultural center, respectively.

In collaboration with UNICEF, in 2024 GB Panama continued to deliver essential water and sanitation infrastructure at migrant reception stations in rural communities in the Darien region, improving hygiene conditions for thousands of vulnerable migrant families arriving in the area.

PANAMA

Healthcare Program:

2024 was a year of enormous growth and impact for healthcare programming in Panama. GB Panama hosted over 90 brigade groups, comprising 1,470+ volunteers, both records in the 16 year history of operations in the country. The health team graduated a new group of 21 Community Health Workers in March, and in the second half of the year started training for a new group of 20 CHEs, expected to complete training in 2025.

In addition work was continued on the expansion and strengthening of the network of Community Health Entrepreneurs in rural Panamanian partner communities. These CHEs, known as "Botiquines del Pueblo" in Panama are government certified to sell affordable over the counter medication in their communities.

As a result of GB Panama's successful WASH collaboration with UNICEF, the partnership expanded in 2024 to deliver critical healthcare services to migrant populations in the Darién region and strengthen Community Health Entrepreneurs in surrounding communities.

PANAMA

Economic Development Program:

In 2024, Mi Solución Financiera (MSF Eskala), continued as a leader of microfinance in the rural areas of the country, demonstrating its commitment to growing local economies in partner communities. MSF Eskala grew its investment portfolio to well over a million dollars, reaching a portfolio size of over \$1.7 million by the end of 2024. In 2024 alone MSF Eskala in Panama disbursed over \$1 million in low interest loans to the most vulnerable populations in rural and indigenous communities.

MSF Eskala was a key participant in 3 of the 5 economic development projects that the Inter-American Development Bank implemented in Panama. In addition to MSF Eskala's impact, Business Brigades volunteers provided business consulting services to 25 small businesses in 13 partner communities in Panama. GHANA

Global Brigades established its first community partnerships in Ghana's Central Region in 2011. As we expanded to a new continent and country, our initial focus was on building strong relationships with the Ghana Water Company, the Ghana Health Service, and local community leadership structures. Over time, these collaborations have positioned Global Brigades as a leader in community development in the region. The more densely populated partner communities in Ghana, compared to those in Central America, present unique challenges and opportunities, which have shaped the development of distinct program methodologies tailored to the local context.







GHANA

Healthcare Program:

2024 was a year of continued growth and innovation for healthcare programming in Ghana. The team strengthened its partnership with the Vibrant Village Foundation, expanding grant funding, and implemented mobile clinics in six partner communities in the extremely underserved three northern regions, providing care to 2,860 patients.

Late in the year, work began on renovating the health renovating health center in Ankaful and the construction of a new centre in Ntereso. Additionally, 13 in-person and virtual volunteer groups, comprising over 250 volunteers, supported healthcare access across partner communities, including the expansion of dental services following a successful pilot in 2023.

Economic Developmental Program:

In 2022, GB Ghana invested \$70,000 in rural communities through partnerships with local credit unions. providing access to affordable credit for rural community members in the regions that we work. In 2024, we began implementing a strategy to launch Eskala in Ghana, alongside an additional \$15,000 investment in local credit unions. Eskala Ghana was recognized as the largest shareholder in both of our credit union partners. In addition, the Ghana team hosted a financial literacy workshop for 33 local business owners from our partner communities.

WASH Program:

In 2024, the Ghana Water, Sanitation and Hygiene team collaborated with the Ghana Water Company to install new standpipes and 10,000 liter water storage tanks to benefit over 320 people in Brenyi, and another 330 in Nyamebekyere. The team also drilled 2 new boreholes in Ntereso, our first water project in northern Ghana, that will eventually provide improved access to drinking water for over 1,700 community members, with one borehole serving the health center that is under construction. Lastly GB staff and Public Health brigade volunteers combined to construct toilets and biodigesters for a total of 8 families in four partner communities in rural Ghana improving their access to safe, in-home sanitation infrastructure.

Global Brigades expanded its operations to Guatemala in 2020, beginning with close collaboration with the indigenous leadership and local government in the municipality of Tecpán, Chimaltenango, to better understand community needs and establish strong partnerships in rural areas. Since then, programming has grown to include healthcare and WASH initiatives, each adapted to the local context to maximize impact. Today, GB Guatemala plays a vital role in advancing our mission to reduce inequalities across programming countries, with a particular focus on supporting indigenous communities, especially the Kaqchikel and K'iche' peoples.

Healthcare & WASH Programs:

In 2024, over 490 volunteers across 26 Medical and Dental brigade groups implemented mobile clinics in partner communities throughout Guatemala. Global Brigades' healthcare programming focuses on providing high-quality medical and dental care to the particularly vulnerable Maya populations in mountainous, rural areas. The local team has carefully cultivated relationships with indigenous leadership to deliver services in a manner that respects cultural traditions and community governance structures. Dental care programming experienced significant growth in 2024, nearly doubling the number of patients and treatments from the previous year. Additionally, WASH programming was launched, with volunteers constructing public health infrastructure—including eco-stoves and sanitation units—at schools in 8 partner communities.

GREECE

In 2018, at the invitation of the UN International Organization for Migration and in partnership with the Greek Health Department, Global Brigades began addressing critical gaps in healthcare services for asylum seekers and vulnerable local populations. Working closely with government agencies and NGOs, we initially focused on improving access to healthcare within Long-Term Accommodation sites managed by the IOM. Through this model, we established trust with community members and gained valuable insights, enabling us to adapt and refine our approach to meet the unique needs of refugees and asylum seekers striving for integration, and ultimately open our own full time clinic in Athens.







GREECE

Healthcare Program:

In 2024, the GB Greece Polyclinic in Athens advanced its mission of delivering consistent, comprehensive healthcare to the city's most vulnerable populations, including refugees and asylum seekers. Over the course of the year, our team welcomed more than 300 volunteers—both in person and virtually—who played a vital role in supporting patient care and advancing educational programming in collaboration with partner organizations. Together, we facilitated 28 educational workshops, with a particular focus on reaching shelters for unaccompanied minors.In 2024, A new triage station was introduced, giving volunteers the chance to engage more directly with patients and gain valuable clinical experience. The dental program also expanded significantly through a partnership with the NGO Seeds of Humanity, helping to meet the growing demand for dental care among the refugee community. Toward the end of the year, the team strengthened services further by adding access to a general practitioner through a local partnership, complementing the specialty care already offered at the clinic.

Economic Development Program:

Greece Economic Development Program: Many refugees living in Greece face significant economic barriers. To help address these challenges, Global Brigades Greece's Business Program works to empower refugee and migrant populations in Athens through financial education and tailored support for their micro-enterprises. With guidance from mentors and local staff, business volunteers—both virtual and in-person—provide pro-bono consulting services designed to meet the unique needs of each entrepreneur. The program also helps businesses adopt new technologies and navigate access to financial resources. In 2024, 45 volunteers from five Business Brigades supported a diverse group of small businesses, including Persian and Moroccan grocery stores, an African hair salon, a Palestinian restaurant, and a Syrian dessert shop, strengthening the economic resilience in the community.

Legal Empowerment Program:

The GB Greece Legal Empowerment Program explores the complex legal challenges faced by refugees in Greece, with a focus on asylum procedures, refugee and migration law and human rights advocacy. Volunteers examine the structural barriers to justice that asylum seekers and refugees encounter, particularly in contexts where access to legal resources is limited or nonexistent. Through analysis of case studies and collaboration frameworks with organizations such as the Greek Council for Refugees, the program highlights legal and ethical considerations involved in safeguarding the rights of refugees within the broader European and international legal systems. Special attention is given to unaccompanied refugee minors, who benefit from legal guidance and human rights education...In 2024, 45 volunteers from five Legal Empowerment Brigades partnered with local organizations to deliver educational workshops to unaccompanied refugee minors, strengthening protections and opportunities for refugee communities in Greece.

Following a thorough assessment of potential partner communities in 2023, Global Brigades officially began hosting volunteers and implementing programs in Belize in 2024. Our work focuses on improving healthcare access for the country's small but vulnerable rural populations, with emphasis on general medicine and expanding dental and optometry services. Belize's partner communities are culturally and linguistically diverse—including Latino, Garifuna, and Mayan populations speaking English, Spanish, Creole, and indigenous languages—which informs GB's approach to ensure programs are locally relevant and inclusive.

Healthcare Program:

In 2024, Global Brigades began providing healthcare services in rural partner communities in Belize. In its first year of operations, the program hosted 25 volunteer groups, engaging over 500 participants. Programming focused on the southern districts of Stann Creek and Toledo, home to some of the country's most vulnerable populations in terms of healthcare access. With support from the Honduras GB team, the local Belize team expanded throughout the year, strengthening relationships with local healthcare providers and laying the foundation for continued growth in 2025.

Carbon Offsetting Program

In 2024, Global Brigades advanced its Carbon Offsetting Program, reinforcing our commitment to environmental sustainability and climate action. By partnering with local farmers, the program supported reforestation and sustainable land management practices that restore ecosystems, capture carbon, and protect biodiversity. Community leaders and members were also engaged in training on water conservation and resource stewardship, ensuring that climate solutions are community-driven and long-lasting. In 2024 alone, in partnership with the Villa Santa Agroforestry Cooperative, the program planted more than 11,270 trees, improving soil health, supporting sustainable farmer livelihoods, and building climate resilience in partner communities.







In 2024, Squads Abroad empowered over 1,000 high school students to contribute to sustainable development through immersive service-learning programs. Working alongside Global Brigades staff and community partners, students supported education, health, and infrastructure projects that strengthened local schools and improved learning environments. Volunteers also participated in cultural exchange activities, language learning, and leadership development, creating a meaningful two-way impact.

Students gained a deeper understanding of global citizenship while communities benefited from tangible improvements and long-term support. In 2024, Squads Abroad volunteers supported communities in Honduras, Panama, Guatemala, Belize, Ghana, and Greece, channeling resources and energy into projects that directly aligned with the UN Sustainable Development Goals.

Kambia partners with university faculty to integrate Global Brigades' sustainable development work directly into academic curricula through impactful, project-based international learning. By collaborating with our local teams and community partners abroad, faculty and their students contribute meaningfully to our Empowered 1M objectives while enriching their own classroom experience. Beyond enhancing university and college courses, Kambia expands access to global education by forming new partnerships with community colleges and state schools. In 2024, 34 Kambia groups—engaging more than 590 students—helped generate impact across 37 partner communities in Honduras, Panama, Belize, and Greece.

Montemar is redefining housing in Honduras through sustainable design and community-driven financing. Using eco-block construction, innovative master site plans, and local supply chains, Montemar builds neighborhoods centered on dignity, climate resilience, and quality of life. Led by Master Architect James Mary O'Connor and Canadian builder Bruce White, the team advances a new model of community design that harmonizes affordability, sustainability, and the human experience. In 2024, Montemar finalized Tres Arroyos' site plans, submitted environmental licenses, and sold out its first 100 lots within one month—strengthening both families and local economies.







Financial Transparency

Global Brigades is committed to financial transparency, and sharing budgets openly with donors and volunteers. In 2024, funds were strategically invested to expand our Holistic Model to more communities and strengthen program sustainability, with a continued focus on ensuring every investment delivers lasting impact.

Fund Raised

In 2024, Global Brigades raised over \$12.7 million to implement our global health and sustainable development programs. Global Brigades, Inc. (a U.S. 501(c)(3) nonprofit) and each of its international affiliates in Honduras, Panama, Guatemala, Ghana, Greece, Belize, as well as Global Brigades Sustainable Development (Canada) and Global Brigades UK, undergo independent financial audits to ensure accountability and transparency. In Jorge Alvarez, Birgit's funding enabled the completion of a much-needed water system serving more than 440 community members, ensuring safe drinking water for generations to come. And in Estacones, her commitment has already led to the successful drilling of a drinking water well in 2024, the first step in a full water system that will eventually bring clean water access to over 640 people. These projects are more than infrastructure. They represent health, dignity, and opportunity for entire communities, and none of this would have been possible without Birgit's vision and compassion.

"This year was the second time I was able to join our engineering brigade chapter at Dalhousie University. As president of the chapter I was much more involved in the process of the brigades and was given much more responsibility. Although being president was challenging at times especially during exams seasons it was so well worth it to see how much my volunteers loved Honduras. We were assigned to many of the same team as last years brigade including our translator, our coordinator and one of our engineers. This was very special as the returning volunteers had established strong connections with them - we feel like family. Everyone in the community received us with open arms and much generosity and gratitude. We were tasked with the job of designing a water distribution system for the community of Las Marias. This included us surveying the land and taking GPS points of each existing pila and measuring its distance to the main pipeline. Then we made points and put down stakes to mark where the main pipes would be laid.

After taking all of this data we were able to use programs like EPAnet and MapSource to design the water system itself with the help of our engineers. We then created a presentation including the map of the water system, the budget and the water quality test that we took. We then created a speech to present and translated into Spanish. We presented to the community on the final day in spanish and then had space for questions. Afterwards the local dance group had a show for us and we danced with them as well. During the time not at the community, we stayed in a very very nice hotel space which had so much land for us to explore. Had tables for cards at night, a pool to cool down, hammocks to read in and a field where we played soccer every night. It was such an incredible experience to be a part of. It is very rare for engineering students to gain such valuable hands-on experience during their undergrad. I know it affected the entire group deeply and teaches us why we love the profession so much."
